

Ways to Have Your DNA Compared to Unidentified Remains in the 1921 Graves Investigation Project

DNA testing, uploading your file to GEDmatch and opting in are your personal choices and yours alone. Please read the Terms of Service at Ancestry, Family Tree DNA (FTDNA) and GEDmatch carefully to determine which path below is best for you.
